

W. Bloomfield sweeps Lahser

Lahser wins tennis crown

Bloomfield Hills Lahser won its first-ever Metro Suburban Activities Association tennis title by winning the conference meet last week at Troy Athens.

Couch Jan Esper's Knights, 5-0 in MSAA dual meets, amassed 38 points to lead the six-team field. Southfield-Lathrup was a close second with 35 points, Birmingham Groves had 25, Athens 19, and Rochester Adams 18.

"The thing that impressed me about our kids was that they never got tentative," said Esper, who had players in six of the seven flight finals.

"They were always positive and played like they were sure they were going to win. It was the year for us to win it. We had a lot of good returning players and some good younger ones as well."

The only Lahser-less final was No. 1 singles. Jerry Sovinsky of Lathrup beat Athens' Mike Balos, 3-6, 6-3.

Lahser's singles champs were Scott Ackerman and Bob Nau. Ackerman won at No. 2, beating Lathrup's Scott Kait, 6-1, 6-3, and Nau took the No. 4 title, handing a 6-1, 6-2 beating to Groves' Mark Mason. In the No. 3 final, Groves' Brad Becker topped Dave Rivera of Lahser, 6-2, 6-2.

Lahser also won No. 1 and 3 doubles crowns. The No. 1 team of Pat Paige and Dave Lee took Lathrup's Jon Pither and Dan Healy, 6-3, 6-2. At No. 3, Serene Tummala and Jeff Stiteler ousted Lathrup's Doug Velick and Mike Noorily, 6-4, 4-6, 6-0.

Lathrup won the No. 2 doubles final. The team of Marc Schechter and Dean Singer stopped Lahser's Tim Sechowski and Joe Atkins, 6-1, 6-3.

Birmingham Seaholm won its second-straight Southeastern Michigan Association tennis title by winning the conference meet last week.

Seaholm led the eight-team field with 24 points, four more than second-place Berkley. Bloomfield Hills Andover took third with 17 points, Southfield had 14, Troy 10, Royal Oak Kimball and Ferndale five each and Hazel Park two.

"This has been a real co-operative bunch of boys, and it's been a pleasure to be around them," said Seaholm coach Lew Parry. "This is a balanced team with outstanding talent. Our No. 1 doubles team, for example, lost just once all year — and that was to Cranbrook."

Andover's Jon Loomis advanced to the finals in top singles before losing to Berkley's Mike Jacobson, 6-3, 6-1. Seaholm won the next two singles finals. Jamie Michelson beat Berkley's Greg Brooke, 6-2, 7-5, at No. 2, and Jamie Pitt took Berkley's Peter Fontana, 6-4, 6-3, at No. 3.

In the No. 4 singles final, Berkley's Rob Murphy downed Andover's Paul Vrazal, 6-0, 6-1.

Seaholm won the three doubles titles. At No. 1, John Wilkinson and Paul Olmstead combined to beat Southfield's Russ McCoy and Mike Applefield, 6-2, 6-2. The No. 2 team of Bill Mathews and Jim Elmsman put down Berkley's Bryan Waldman and David Charlip, 6-3, 6-2. Tom Kemp and David Fishman whipped Tim Brice and Mike Chiado, 6-3, 6-3.

SEALED BIDS for the purchase of tax anticipation notes of Clarenceville School District, Counties of Oakland and Wayne, Michigan, on the par value of \$650,000.00 will be received by the undersigned at 2010 Middlefield Road, Livonia, Michigan 48152, until 7:00 o'clock, P.M., Eastern Daylight Time, on the 7th day of June, 1982. At which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

NOTE DETAILS: INTEREST MATURING DATE AND DISCOUNTS: The notes will be dated June 15, 1982, will mature February 21, 1983 and will bear interest at a rate not exceeding 18% per annum. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company located in the State of Michigan to be designated by the original purchaser of the notes which paying agent qualifies as such under the Statute of the State of Michigan or of the Federal Government, subject to the approval of the School District, with paying agent, if any, to be paid by the purchaser of the notes. Determinations and form of notes to be at the option of the issuer. Accrued interest on date of delivery of such notes must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

PRIOR REDEMPTION: The notes shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

AWARD OF NOTES: For the purpose of awarding the notes the interest end of each bid will be computed on a 360 day year basis by determining, at the rate or rates bid, the total dollar value of all interest on the notes from July 15, 1982 to the maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. Bids may include calculation of interest cost based upon the above computation but the calculation shall be subject to verification by the municipality based upon the rate or rates bid. The notes will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest dollar interest cost to the municipality. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the notes or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

SECURITY: The loan in anticipation of the operating portion of the School Tax for the fiscal year July 1, 1982 to June 30, 1983 which is to be due and payable December 1, 1982. The School District has pledged to establish a special fund to be used solely to pay the principal and interest on the notes when due, and has pledged to set aside in said fund an amount sufficient to repay the principal and interest on the notes when due. A portion of each dollar of taxes remaining to be collected for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1982 up to the principal amount of the notes bears to the amount of the taxes to be levied and to be collected for operating expenses, anticipated delinquency in collections being taken into account, until the amount so set aside is sufficient for the payment of the notes.

In addition, the notes will be a General Obligation of the School District and tax collections are insufficient to pay the notes when due. The School District has pledged to use any and all other resources available for payment of said notes. The School District does not have the power to levy taxes for payment of the notes in excess of its constitutional and statutory tax rate limit.

ADDITIONAL BORROWING: The School District reserves the right to issue additional notes of equal standing to the notes in this issue to meet current operating and payroll expenses.

GOOD FAITH: A certified or cashier's check in the amount of 10% of the par value of the notes drawn upon accepted and bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is not accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the notes. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned.

LEGAL OPINION, DELIVERY OF NOTES: Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of the purchaser's attorney approving the legality of the notes, to be secured at the purchaser's expense. The purchaser shall furnish notes ready for execution on this date. Notes will be delivered at a place to be agreed upon with the purchaser within the State of Michigan and within 7 days from award of bid.
