The three-act mystery-comedy by Alec Coppel will be presented at 8:30 pm. June 11-12 and 17-19 in Franklin School on Franklin Road between 13 and 14 Mille roads.

Profits from the benefit performances will be donated to the Franklin Community Association to build a gazebo on the village green in the historic district next door to the town hall near the baseball fields.
