Puppetry taught to those who work with children

Ellen Wahi, Northville drama teacher and director of Creative Day Nursery, will lead a four-session class on puppetry for librarians, teachers and adults who work with children. The class, beginning at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, starts June 22. Fee is \$24.
