Puppetry taught to those who work with children

Ellen Wahl, Northville drama teacher and director of Creative Day Nursery, will lead a four-session class on puppetry for librarians, teachers and adults who work with children. The class, beginning at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, starts June 22. Fee is \$24.

Wahl transforms favorite stories from children's literature into stage presentations using shadow, stick, hand, marionette and life-size puppets. Presentations will include the use of improvisation, choral speaking, repetition and music. A session will be devoted to making shadow and stick puppets using

plastic forms, tissue paper, poster-board, cellophane, fun-felt and paint. Children may enjoy Wahl's creative talents in a preschool drama class for 4-6-year-olds on Tuesdays and Thursdays, beginning June 22.

The four-session class is an introduction to the theater through the use of shadow puppetry, soft sculpture and music.

Children will participate in stage presentations making their own stick puppets or masks, dramatizing favorite story-book characters.
