Spielberg's effects provide excitement in poltergeist tale

Recently, a Hollywood flap has erupted over just who was the creative force behind "Poltergeist" (PG). Steven Spielberg, the coproducer and co-writer, or Tobe Hooper, the director?

The evidence, that is the movie, points toward Spielberg as the conception of the movie with its succession of special effects, but the composition of the movie with its succession of special effects, but mose were achieved without the gristiness associated with Spielberg's hand is evident, especially in the first half of the film which presents a vignette of family life that is rich in anecdote and detail. The family in focus is a middle-class suburban household consisting of mother, father, older daughter, middle son, younger daughter, dog and, briefly, a bird.

THE DOG ADDS an extra dimension of interest to the movie whenever he appears. He is a wonderfully laid-back, California canine with the most dogyey personality (as opposed to cute, noble or smart movie dogs) I've ever seen in a film. He is the kind of nighttime provier who lopes through the house nibbling potato chips and polishing off lefttovers wherever he finds them.

nibbling potato chips and polishing off lettovers wherever in mus-suddenly, this contented, mock-ordinary husehold is disrupted by a series of strange experiences. At first, what happens is just odd and amusing, but the frequency and intensity of the supernativa-tion of the supernatival occurrences increase rapidly and the amusement quickly turns to fear and terror. The youngest child disappears, although her voice can be heard calling to her mother to come and get her. The family brings in experts in supernatural phenomena to help retrieve the daughter. It is at this point that the movie loses what coherence it has. We might say, the more impressive the special effects, the less coherent the story.

RUN TO THE the light, the missing child is told. No, don't run to the light, it's dangerous. Run, don't run. No wonder the kid's in limbo when her parents always give her contradictory instructions. But that's not the worst of it. The end of the film has a loophole hig enough to drive a subdivision through. As a moving wan is shown loading furriture from the house, the father goes off to work saying he will try to get home early and take the famility to a motel for the night. Yet, we see the mother sending the children off to bed for the night — and in a house which still seems chock-full of furnitures.

For many people, however, what matters about a movie like this is not the logic of it but the hole. The story is simply a skeletal framework (pun intended) for hanging a passe of special effects. The effects are marvelous — inadimate objects in a flurry of motion, twisting forms of light gliding down a staircase. Shiver and shriek time.

With all these wonders and all this expertise, why the inconsistencies? Is this an instance of too many people directing the film or it is just a poltergeist playing tricks on us?
