I heard that a white dye was added to skim milk to make it look better. What is it and is it harmful? N.W. Southfield

According to Chet Lackey of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, on dyes are added to milk. What is added to skim milk powder. This is used as a flavor enhancer as well as giving the milk a whiter color. When fats. are removed from milk, the color and flavor are diminished, so addition of dry milk powder makes an otherwise bland grey liquid more palatable. uid more palatable.

poor soil, drought conditions and cli-matic extremes can lessen the chances of tree survival in our cities. It is im-portant to select varieties that can sur-vive these unhealthy conditions.

Trees are powerful allies in the bat-tle against air pollution. They remove carbon dioxide from the air and release oxygen which washes air. Gaseous pol-lutants and air particulates are also collected by the foliage and washed to the ground by rainfall.

The need to develop varieties of plant materials that can survive urban plant materials that can survive orban stress becomes increasingly important. Research is continuing in this field. Un-il more information is available, the following trees recommended as best able to survive urban conditions are red misple (acer rubrum), girkgo (girk-go biloba), Japanese black- pine (pinus bumbergil), and willow oak (quercus phellos).
