The jumping division, where horses are seen hurdling a series of obstacles along a specially designed course, is the most common to the average observer.

AN OWNER OF three horses, Inman says it takes a special relationship to handle each one of them. She is riding 'Centrefold' and 'One for the Road' in the INSILCO races, and she's breaking a Danish horse — Everon — for future

races.
"It's a challenge riding horses, and
there's always a danger involved in it,"
said Inman, the youngest of June and
Paul Inman's five children.

"You can get hurt, but I haven't had any big accidents. I've failen and had bruisse, but I've never really hurt haven't have good horses and your confident, you can succeed without get-ing hurt. And, if you have the proper instruction, the ride is worth it because you get the thrill of having a crowd cheer you on. "It's a chailenge working with another mind... to try and work together as a team... you and the borse. If the horse doesn't have the capabilities that some of the other horses have, it's up to you to bring out the best in your horse."

ONE OF Inman's immediate goals it to place well at the Bloomfield Open Hunt's Motor City and Detroit hose shows that start June 16. Eventually, she would like to participate in the Olympics.

"My Irainer, Katle Monahan (formerly of Bloomfield Hills but now a resident of Virginia) was chosen for 1980 Olympic team," said Imman. "And, she's hoping to be on the 1934 team." I see the dedication and hard work it takes just by watching her. I'd like to make the Olympics in 1984, but I'd still be young enough to make the 88 Olympics.

"Right now, I'm looking forward to competiting against the pros in the Grand Prix classes like they're offering in Detroit. And, I'd like to qualify to show in November at Madison Square Garden."
