are barbiturates (aleeping pills) and antibitstamines (drugs used for allergian
de colds, 50. Twould suggest that you
do not drink any alcoholic beverage
when taking Valium.

Is there some reason why you are
continuing to take Valium? Perhaps
you think you need it more than you
actually do.

Possibly you could substitute exercise or some other healthful activity
for the drug. It would be wise to discuss
your use of Valium with your doctor at
your next visit.
