ic society. The community college, in a rapidly changing job market, has the flexible enrollment and scheduling policies that can serve those who need to be retrained. Community colleges should develop television courses for cable casting on all cable systems being developed in Oakland County."

ADAM SARKIS KARIBIAN, 133 Puritan, Birmingham. Born in 1937. Lived in Oakland County for 31 years. Married and have four children. Practicing architect and function as principal in the firm Adam S. Karibian & Associates, Architects P.C. Bachelor of architecture degree from the University of Michigan, master of architecture, through a fellowship grant, University of Michigan.

1. "To direct its academic and physical growth while being responsive to the educational needs and fiscal considerations of the several communities that comprise Oakland County. A trustee should inform himself about matters that relate directly with the educational aspirations of today's students, such as: costs, career opportunities, quality of the teaching staff, and physical facilities.

2. "Cuts should be made wherever duplication of management efforts exists. Management efficiency should be stressed and, where redundancy exists, eliminated. Expansion requirements for physical plant facilities

should be evaluated between new construction and the purchase and re-cycling of existing structures. Selection of the most cost-effective approach should then be made. I would not support the concept of reducing the liberal arts programs for budgetary reasons.

3. "Working in concert with local high schools and four-year colleges and universities to provide the greatest quality education for the least cost to the student. Expansion of the program offerings to attract students into the community college concept. Taking up the slack in programs begin eliminated by four-year colleges. Defining the educational objective of the college as it relates to the 1980s, and then charting a course of action to accomplish it."

SUZANNE E. REYNOLDS (incumbent), 4253 Somerville, West Bloomfield. Born 1940. wife of Bill Reynolds, small businessman in Union Lake. Three children, Jay (15), Ray (12), Anyanne (9), students in West Bloomfield Schools. MS (mass communications), BS (vocational home economics), Indiana State University. President, Detroit West Suburban Delta Gamma Chapter; serve on the board of directors, Women for United Fund (United Foundation).

1. "I see the role of a community college trustee as having four major parts. One must have a philosophy and goals based on the needs of the community. A trustee is responsible for hiring and maintaining a president that will

work with the students, faculty, staff, community and the board. A trustee must be willing to initiate policies that bring alive the established philosophy and goals of the institution. And lastly, a trustee must be aware of the feelings and reactions of the citizens.

2. "In order to prioritize those programs that would have to be cut from a college budget, it would be necessary to first reassess and survey community needs and then cut the budget accordingly. It is my hope that we would be able somehow to get funding from other sources so very little or hopefully nothing would have to be cut for the sake of our students.

3. "Community colleges, unlike the K-12 program, are facing a influx of students because of the poor economic climate, and the ever-increasing numbers of people unemployed. Quality programs must be maintained in spite of enrollment increases. Community Colleges have been praised for their personal touches with students."

ANTONIA J. SANCHEZ-MURPHY, 261 Draper, Pontiac. School psychologist, Wisner Center, Pontiac - giving and evaluating psychological test to junior and senior high school students. Certified social worker, guidance counselor - secondary level; permanent teaching certificate - secondary level, psychology, sociology and Spanish. 1. "The role of an Oakland Community College trustee is to work cooperatively with other trustees in assisting the administration to complete the stated goals and objectives of the college for each fiscal year. A trustee needs to bring an open mind and a clear perspective regarding the value of higher education and vocational training and a keen understanding of the current social, economic and political issues facing Oakland County, the State of Michigan and the United States today.

2. "It is the function of the Oakland Community College administration to suggest specific cuts in individual programs if there were to be any cuts made in the future. However, I would certainly be in favor of making the college and its various departments and programs more efficient and cost-effective to avoid having to cut any specific program. Any cuts in the college budget would be worked out between the administration and board of trustees to the mutual advantage of the college and its student population.

3. "Oakland Community College needs to continue being sensitive to the needs of its surrounding communities, its student population and the competitive labor market. It needs to provide both liberal arts curricula for those students who wish a two-year degree toward an eventual four year degree and the one-year and two-year vocational training programs for those students interested in specific technical-vocational skills."
