Make play dough at home

Several years ago at one of your consumer conferences, I picked up a recipe for home-made play dough. I've misplaced it and with my kids home for the summer I thought it would be a good idea to make some for them to use.

Here are two versions for you to choose from. They are furnished by Lauri O'Neill, nursery school teacher and Concern volunteer.

UNCOOKED PLAY DOUGH
2 cups white flour
1 cup table salt
6 tsp. alum (available at drugstores)
2 Tbsp. salad oil
1 cup water plus several drops of food coloring of your choice
Mix all ingredients in a large bowl. Knead and store in an airtight container.

COOKED PLAY DOUGH

Bring to boil:
1 cup water and food coloring
1 cup table salt
Mix:
2 cups white flour
6 tsp. alum
2 Tbsp. salad oil

Add boiled mixture to dry ingredients and knead. Always store in airtight containers to avoid drying.

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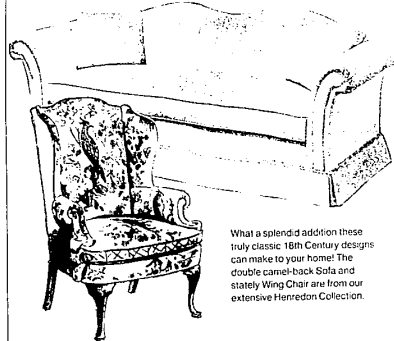
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
