Cotick said the fact that individual homes will be photographed adds an appeal lacking in the audit program currently provided by Detroit Edison and Consumers Power.
The utility companies audits, however, arm the homeowner with a multitude of energy conservation information, according to James Connelly, director of customer and marketing services for Edison's Oakland Division.
"Unless they're going to go all around the house (with the camera), I doubt the thermograms will be more effective. We have competent people who spend three to four hours in a home conducting a well-engineered audit and asking the customer questions. "A thermogram is just a picture," he said.

COUNCIL MEMBER Jan Dolan has seen substantial progress made in energy conservation-minded communities which have utilized the government-subsidized thermogram program.
"We have seen what it's done in other communities and it's really getting the energy conservation program going," Dolan said.
"Several years ago National Geographic wrote about Plymouth's experience (with thermogram scanning). Once they figured out what was going on, people really took it to heart. A lot of them insulated and cut their utility costs."
City officials hope to schedule a meeting before July 15 to explain the program and solicit letters of support from homeowners. If approved by the state, the city would receive funding to conduct the program a year from the upcoming winter.
"The states wants to fund communities which are earnestly concerned

with energy conservation, and not just applying for a freebie," said Cotick.
The state has money sufficient to conduct thermogram scanning on 3,100 miles of roads. Approval of Farmington Hills' application would reduce that figure by 270 miles, Cotick added.
Dolan said meetings will be set up with homeowners if the grant is received.
"Within subdivisions and communities, we'd like to get people in to see a presentation and look at films (of their streets). If they won't come to us, maybe we can come to them and say, 'we have photographs, and this is how we can help you,'" she said.
"The energy commission will have a booth at the Founders Festival, I'd like to see us really push it and get people enthused. The city should do anything it can to promote . conservation," added Dolan, an energy commission member.
"Natural gas isn't going to be here forever."
