## for picnic safety The one guest you don't want to in-vite to your outdoor picnic is food poi-

soning.

Oakland County's Cooperative Ex-tension Service offers three simple tips for keeping food safe in warm weather. They are: keep hot foods hot; keep cold foods cold; and keep food clean.

Food poisoning bacteria grow best between 60 and 120 degrees fahrenheit, so food stored within this temperature range for more than two hours is likely

range for more than two hours is likely to be contaminated. Hot food should be heated to at least 140 degrees and transported to a near-by picnic site in an insulated chest or bag. As long as the food is kept warmer than 140 degrees, it is safe to travel distances more than two hours away. Hot food can also be refrigurated and reheated or cooked at the picnic area.
