



2 named to newspaper group posts

Richard D. Isham, 44, was appointed general manager of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers this week. He will succeed John W. Reddy, 49, who was promoted to corporate vice president/editori-

Both changes are effective July 26. The an-ouncement of the changes was made by Richard Aginian, president of Suburban Communications orporation (SCC), parent company of Observer &

Eccentric Newspapers.

In his new position, Isham will be responsible for all departments in the newspaper group, including advertising, business, circulation, computer services, editorial and production. Observer & Eccentric Newspapers publishes 12 (wice-a-week newspapers in the northern and western suburbs of Detroit.

Reddy will assist the editorial departments at all

SCC newspapers. In addition to the Detroit area group, the company publishes newspapers near Northville, Howell, Lansing and Cincinnati.

ISHAM IS publisher of the Kokomo (Ind.) Tri-bune. He has been in Kokomo since 1967, where he has served in several executive capacities including production manager, operations manager and gen-eral manager, in addition to publisher.

His varied newspaper career includes stints with the Rochester (N.Y.) Times Union, Ithaca (N.Y.) Journal and Copley newspapers in California.

"I am looking forward to the challenge of coming to the Detroit area," Isham said. "It appears that the newspapers are well-produced and edited. There's plenty of opportunity to grow in Detroit." Reddy has been general manager of the Observe & Eccentric since May 1977. He previously was ex-

OCC, K-12 districts in curriculum pact

Oakland Community College President Robert F. Roelofs outlined several new programs. In addition, he received board approval for a computer link-up

system.

The college has worked out an articulation agreement with K-12 school districts in Oakland County, so students

who attend OCC will not have to repeat courses they already took during previ-

courses they already took ouring previous years.

An articulation agreement signifies that the K-12 course material leads into the college material, with no overlaps and no gaps.

Foreign languages, calculus and ad-

vanced English courses fall into the ar-ticulation agreement courses, Roelofs fold the board of trustees last week.

"We solicit people for the committee from recommendations we receive from faculty, staff and other persons in the community, Teolefos said.

The board approved a Paradyne Loop, a link to the college's computer system.

The \$33,000 system will save the col-lege \$2,500 to \$2,700 a year in tel-phone bills, Roelofs estimated.

Presently, every time information from a computer terminal on a satel-lite campus is transmitted to the cer-

tral office, it goes over an individual telephone line. There are 20-30 termi-nals on each campus, all using a sepa-rate telephone line.

WITH THE link-up, all terminals on one campus will be tied to one loop, and only one telephone line will be needed to transmit all information from the entire campus.

"The big loop goes all around the col-lege (campus) and goes to central off-ice. There's no need for individual con-nections at each station," Roelofs re-

"This facility will alleviate the need for additional connections. It's faster and less expensive then the current sys-tem," Roelofs said.
