

Courses At OCC Approved

Students from North Farmington and Farmington High Schools will take courses at Oakland Community College this fall under the provisions of an agreement between OCC and the Farmington Board of Education.

Approximately 60 students have signed up for courses in data processing and food service technology. The school district will pay tuition costs of \$50 per student.

Farmington's Director of Vocational Education Earl Baumann said that more than 200 students from junior and senior high schools had applied for the courses.

Budget limitations had forced the administration to limit the program to vocational rather than academic training, he said. All the students who applied for the courses as part of a job training will attend, according to Baumann.
