# Fox trots to victory in Festival contest

How appropriate. A man named Fox led the pack in the 10-kilometer run at the Farmington Founders' Festival Fox Trot Saturday.

That would be Tim Fox, a 28-year-old Southfield resident who calls himself an "on-and-off" runner. He finished the 10-kilometer (6.2-mile) subdivision course with a time of 30:46.

Fox, who was running in the men's 25-29 group, was named Amateur Athletic Union's Runner of the Year in 1979. He called the Festival victory "a comeback geared to the Free Press Marathon."

"The weather couldn't have been more cooperative, and I really enjoyed the course," said Fox, referring to the

flat terrain on the Kendallwood subdivision streets in back of the sponsoring Farmington-Area YMCA.

"I really appreciated missing the hills of Farmington. I remember the good old days when this was a 10-mile run through Farmington. I remember there were some bad hills."

Fox, a mechanical designer for Southfield's Eaton Corp., was followed in the 10-kilometer race by Farmington Hills' Paul Welch, an outstanding runner during his high school days at North Farmington.

They were two of 490 runners who took part in the Fox Trot's two races. The was also a five-kilometer race over the same course. There were 18 competitive divisions, nine each for men and women.

ANDY KRAFSUR, another Southfield resident and a former prep cross country standout at Southfield-Lathrup, was the overall winner in the 5-kilometer race with a 15:18 clocking. Krafsur, 20, will be a senior at Albion College.

Don Anderson, a Farmington resident running in the 25-29 division, finished a close second to Krafsur in the 5-kilometer with a time of 15:18.1.

Okemos' Kathy Irwin-Grover, 23, was a repeat winner. She was the first woman across the line in the 5-kilometer race with an 18:47. She finished 33rd overall. She won last year's short race in 19:01 and finished 41st overall.

"I like the (Fox Trot) route," said Irwin-Grover, who ran on Michigan State University's women's track and
