They complemented each other swell it appeared as though they had played together for years.

Severinsen has performed with many orchestras, but he continually praised the Detroit Symphony Orchestra as standout musicians.

"When I learned that I would be playing with them, I told everyone how wonderful they're supposed to be and that I was excited to play with them, Everinsen told the audience.

"Now that I've played with them, I realize they're even better than I thought. They are surely one of the world's greatest group of musicians, and it has been an honor to play with them."
