dollar spent on the "I Love New York" promotion. I'll make protecting the environment a priority, to provide a natural heritage for our children and to allow both agriculture and tourism to grow in Michigan.

Q-The Single Business Tax has been under attack from all sides. What, if anything, should be done to change it?

The Single Business Tax ought to be repealed or drastically revised. Any tax must be based on the ability to pay, and the Single Business Tax is taxing unprofitable businesses and falling heavily on smaller businesses. I will work for changes in the SBT as a top priority so that the state does not continue to make hard times even harder.

Q-How will you vote if an equal rights amendment comes before the Congress and Legislature again? Why? How do you feel about the enactment of an equal rights amendment to the state constitution?

I strongly support the Equal Rights Amendment and have worked and contributed to the Michigan ERAmerica Coalition. I would support a Michigan ERA if adoption of such state amend-

ments does not hamper the drive for inclusion of the ERA in the United States Constitution. While we have encountered a temporary setback in the fight for equal rights I hope to help lead the fight in the Senate in the new effort to include women in the United States Constitution.

Q-Why did you agree/disagree with the state personal income tax voted in last May?

I supported the temporary income tax increase. I oppose any extension of this additional tax, or any attempt to make the tax permanent. The Legislature must first make sense of what it spends, before asking higher taxes. A Legislature that continues to fund the Pontiac Stadium, while cutting aid to schools, has not faced our present crisis. That will be my first priority as a new member of the state Senate, to fight bad programs, so that we can afford good programs. We cannot ask the citizens of Michigan in the worst of times to sustain a significant new tax increase.

Because the Legislature has failed to make the hard decisions about where to cut the budget, cuts have been made across the board, in good programs and bad. With a half-billion-dollar deficit still remaining, the Legislature then added a temporary tax to balance the

budget. In the new Legislature, I'll work to make sure that the Pontiac Stadium subsidy is ended, that unnecessary new highways are removed from the budget and that aid to private college students is halted so that we can fund public education, mental health, prison construction and other critical programs without another large tax increase.

Q-Our state and federal road system has reached maturity in the last few years and rapidly is deteriorating. What programs should be implemented to restore the roads?

With our road system in dangerous disrepair, the Legislature continues to spend more than a third of its road budget on building new highways, often badly planned, as those of us who live in the 15th Senate district well know. I support proposed legislation to divert funds for new roads to the repair budget, to meet the present crisis.

Q-SEMTA has experienced a 20-percent cut in its operating budget and expects more cuts as federal aid shrivels. How should the public transit operating funds question be addressed?

No public transit system in the United States is able to operate without some public subsidy, but public transit

must operate, so that people who don't own automobiles can work and participate in society. Many people, especially senior citizens, would be stranded without some sort of public transit system. Michigan cannot provide significant new revenue to make up for cuts in federal aid, but must fight those cuts. Just as we in the Midwest helped pay for water projects in the West, and the provision of electric power to other regions of the country as far back as the TVA, the federal government must help meet the particular needs of our part of the country, including transit in metropolitan areas. The voters must then decide what further level of transit service should be provided, by popular vote.

Q-Do you support a) the "human life amendment" prohibiting abortion? b) Medicaid funding of abortions?

I oppose the "Human Life Amendment" I support Medicaid funding for abortion so that poor women are not forced to resort to cut-rate abortions or dangerous self-abortion methods. I have taken an active role on the right to choose and other issues of particular concern to women, and have been endorsed by the National Organization of Women.

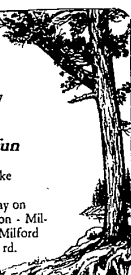
