

# Snively trains at Olympic Center

Roth Snively, 22055 W. Brandon, Farmington Hills, is participating in a special shooting program at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. The program has been developed by the National Rifle Association, the national governing body for competitive shooting in the United States.

The program is designed to improve the skills of young shooters and prepare them for national and international events namely, the 1983 Pan American Games and the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

Snively is involved in a two-week Junior Olympic resident camp which primes the marksmen for the U.S. Junior championships later this year. If he scores well at the championships, Snively will be a member of one of the NRA's development teams.

Affiliated with the Livonia Sportsmen's Club, Snively is one of the top junior shooters in the Midwest. He was the Michigan state Rifle and Pistol Association champion in the winter league and the junior air rifle last year

and a member of the state air rifle and position teams. He is coached by Terry Danci, Dick Floyd and Berry Braun.

The national sponsor of the Olympic Training Center is Miller High Life of Milwaukee. Located at the former Ent Air Force Base, the Olympic Complex has been used by more than 35,000 potential Olympians since opening in the summer of 1978. The center accommodates 550 athletes and all expenses are borne by the United States Olympic Committee.

Snively is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Snively of Farmington Hills.

While here the marksmen practice about three to four hours on the range and spend additional hours working on physical and mental conditioning. The physical training is important because the shooter needs to have a low heartbeat. It is not uncommon for the best shooters to be able to pace themselves to fire between heartbeats. Of course, the mental side of the sport requires intense concentration and relaxation.

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"My brother drove by the ballpark at 11 o'clock last night (Monday) and said there were no less than a half-dozen people out there with flashlights looking," said Allen R. DuQuet, owner of DuQuet Jewelers and husband of the woman who lost the ring.

NEWS OF the loss of such a valuable diamond spread fast, DuQuet said, even reaching an old friend of his living in Lansing.

"If nothing else, it restores your faith in human nature," DuQuet said. "I had an old couple in their 70s call me and said they felt so bad about the loss they had to go the park and help us look for it, but they wanted to know if someone had already found it. They didn't want to waste the effort at their age."

One young boy reported finding what

he thought was the diamond, DuQuet said, but when he brought the item in to the jeweler it was found to be a broken piece of a soda-pop bottle.

"I've got to tell you something," DuQuet said. "The only good thing to come out of this whole thing is I found I've got friends. It's almost like I lost my wife the way they're calling to express their regrets."

Diamond hunter Debbie Dudas was on all four Monday evening looking for the gem in hopes of financing a vacation.

Bobby Mack, 14, of Rochelle Park, N.J., learned about the lost diamond while visiting his cousin, Jim Mack of Farmington Hills, and uncle, Edward Motyka of Farmington Hills. He said if he finds the diamond he'll apply the reward toward his college education and quit his job delivering the New Jersey Record and New York Daily News.
