

700 swimmers compete

Live Y'ers finish 2nd in Long Course meet

Jim Bruzese, Dan Wery and Doug Cleland made names for themselves as high-school swimmers last winter. And like most serious swimmers, they don't forget their sport in the summer.

Bruzese and Wery, two of Rochester High's top tankers, and Rochester Adams' Cleland accounted for six first places to help their off-season squad, the Oakland Live Y'ers, finish second in the Amateur Athletic Union Long Course Meet over the weekend in Southfield's 50-meter Civic Center Pool.

The Live Y'ers, one of 40 Michigan teams to converge on Southfield for the meet, scored 556 points to finish a distant second to the Dearborn Recreation Dolphins, which amassed 788 points to win their second-straight Long Course championship.

"We're pretty much a senior (older) team during the summer," said Live Y'ers coach Mark Gibson, a recent University of Michigan graduate and a former prep swimmer at Birmingham Brother Rice. "We don't have too many younger kids and that's why we can't really challenge Dearborn."

The Royal Oak Penguins, which hosted the annual meet, finished third with 472 points. The Ann Arbor Swim Club placed fourth with 399 points, and the Farmington Hills-based Michigan Stingrays Swim Association took fifth with 346.

Two local clubs, the Birmingham-Bloomfield Atlantis and the Southfield Swim Club, finished way down the list.

High used the Long Course Meet as a tune up for the AAU Junior Nationals, which will be held later this month in Columbia, S.C.

Sixteen state records were broken in the meet, including four by Kalamazoo Y'Kai swimmer Jennifer Jackson. Jackson, in the 11-12 age group, set state marks in the 200 freestyle (2:10.75), the 100 butterfly (1:05.90), the 50 butterfly (29.80) and the 200 individual medley (2:28.73).

Allen Gelderlose, swimming in the 15-18 boys circuit for the Dolphins, set a state mark with an 8:38.77 in the 800 freestyle. Teammate Dana Goerke, swimming in the 13-14 girls' group, set a record with a 1:18.89 in the 100 breaststroke.

Jenny Sutton, from the Royal Oak Penguins, set two records in the 10-11 girls class with a 1:27.28 in the 100 breaststroke and a 35.70 in the 50 breaststroke.

JIM HUME of the Ann Arbor Swim Club and Chris Trombley of the Allen Park Barracudas, each set state records. Hume, in the 10-11 boys' division, won the 100 butterfly (1:17.19), while Trombley, in the 11-12 boys' group, was first in the 50 breaststroke (35.92).

The Midland Dolphins' boys' 400 medley relay team in the 13-14 age group clocked in at 4:30.05 for another state record.

The meet attracted more than 700 swimmers.

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BRUZESE WON three events in the boys' 15-17 age group — the 100-meter butterfly, the 200 butterfly and the 100 breaststroke — and finished second to Wery in the 200 breaststroke. Cleland finished first in the 100 backstroke and the 200 backstroke in the same age group.

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NFWB '9' tumbles

Carl Childress can cancel the motel reservations in Memphis, Tenn. His North Farmington-West Bloomfield Metro Sportabout baseball team isn't going anywhere.

Childress' NFWB squad rallied to come close to beating Detroit PAL in the championship game of the Mickey Mantle (16-and-under) American Amateur Baseball Congress Sunday in Coldwater.

But the PAL team used a two-run homer by Eric Russell with two out in the seventh inning to beat NFWB, 8-7, and advance to the Mantle national tournament in Memphis later this month.

Trailing 6-2 after six innings, NFWB exploded for five runs in the seventh to take a 7-6 lead. Rich Goldberg and Bob Butler walked. Craig Matthews singled, scoring Goldberg.

Zac Childress tied the game at 61 with a tremendous home run over the 350-foot sign on the right field wall. The next batter, pitcher Paul Wenson put NFWB ahead, 7-6, with a solo homer over the left field fence.

Wenson, the third of three NFWB pitchers, got the first two PAL batters on a ground out and a tap to the mound. But then he walked Mark Ervin on a three-and-two pitch and served up the home run ball to Russell.

Zac Childress had three hits in three trips and drove in three runs for the losers, and Matthews had two hits and knocked in two runs. Wenson was the losing pitcher.

NFWB compiled a 4-2 tournament record.

NFWB OPENED tourney play with a 12-1 mercy-rule rout of Saginaw St. Peter and Paul. The winners scored 10 runs in the second to support winning pitcher Todd Krumm. Goldberg and Eric Kahkonen each had two hits.

NFWB then beat the same Detroit PAL team, 3-1. Bob Beahn and Zac Childress each had two hits, and Mike Ignasiak pitched the first five innings to earn the victory.

In the next outing, Krumm was the winning pitcher and had two hits as NFWB blunted PAL-Little Caesars, 10-6. Kahkonen and Goldberg also provided two hits each. Sterling Heights handed NFWB its first loss, 8-5. Beahn had two hits, including a home run, in the losing effort.

NFWB avenged that loss with a 14-0 drubbing of Sterling Heights. Krumm picked up his third pitching victory, and Goldberg had two hits and drove in five runs. Butler belted two homers and knocked in four runs.

The 16-and-under North-Central Regional tournament team included four NFWB players — pitcher Krumm, outfielders Butler and Childress and catcher Beahn.

During the regular season, NFWB competed in the 16-and-under Mickey Mantle Division of the Little Caesar's Amateur Baseball Federation. The league sponsors 30 teams from the metropolitan Detroit area.

NFWB won the league championship with an 18-2 record.

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"It was really fun. I met a lot of guys and some really fine athletes who I had played against in high school. And after being off for nearly a year, it was really good to get moving again," Hulse added.

Hulse will attend the University of Pennsylvania this fall.

John Bielis, a graduate of Livonia Churchill, also thought the All-Star classic was good preparation for college football.

"The game and the whole two weeks were a lot of good experience. This was the best possible preparation I could have had to get ready for college ball (at Ferris State)," Bielis said.

"A lot of enemies I had while I was playing in high school, I finally got to know," Bielis added.

Yarema, the Brother Rice standout and all-state quarterback, will attend Michigan State this fall and echoed his teammate's responses to the game.

"The game and the entire time here (at MSU) was very exciting. These are all first class people and I made many good friends. The game itself was a little different from high school ball because of the caliber of the players in the game. I think this is more like what college football will be like," Yarema said.

"I knew the game would be a little different and my performance proved it. I learned that I have to move my feet a little better. But overall, I think the game is a super thing to have," Yarema said.

YAREMA, who early in the game had trouble keeping his footing on the turf at Spartan Stadium, completed five of 10 passes for 66 yards, including one touchdown and one two-point conversion.

Darrel Barkowski from Plymouth Salem, who will be attending Saginaw Valley State College, started for the East team at linebacker and said he enjoyed the contest very much.

"I think it is just great when you get to play with these athletes that are all-Americans and also when the coaches here have combined to win over 1500 games. I feel honored to even be here," Barkowski said.

"I think the exposure is just great and also I made several good friends here. You would be surprised the relationships you can build in just 10 days," he added.
