Shapiro: U-M cuts 'disaster'

The University of Michigan could lose up to \$9 million in the fourth state budget cut of the current fiscal year, says President Harold T. Shapiro. "If the numbers we have been hearing turn out to be correct, it will be an unmitigated disaster," he said. The Ann Arbor campus' share could be \$9 million, while the U-M campuses at Flint and Dearborn may lose up to \$500 000 each.

It would bring the total amount of deferrals and reductions in the 1981-8state fiscal year at Ann Arbor to \$34 million — nearly 25 percent of the university's appropriation.

"WE HAVE tried in every way to be cooperative in helping to meet the state's problems," said Shapiro. "We have gone to extraordinary lengths to cut programs, personnel, which we have pressed enormous tuition increases on the shoulders of students and their families. We have strained every resource available to this institution to make a major commitment to provide meet initiatives in high technology and industrial diversification in this state. "This latest proposal goes far beyond any presently known capacity within the university to sustain quality. Its impact will be destructive to everything we have tried to do to manage this institution in a way that will preserve its core strengths and vifality. "If an order of this magnitude is enacted, the people of this state must be told that they are in danger of losing a resource they have worked 165 years t develop. If no restoration of these cut-hacks occurs, I can almost guarantee the loss.

GUST, AN attorney, has run several times for public office. In 1956 he was the 14th District nom-

inee for Congress. In 1961, he was elected a delegate to the Constitutional Convention. The next year, he ran for and lost the Republican comination for lieutenant governor, and in 1964 he was a candidate for the Republican nomination for attorney general.

He has been active in state fund raising for the Republican party for 22 years.

Gust is also a former vice president, general counsel and secretary of the Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co., where he became quite friendly with Headlee, who is president of the Farmington Hills-based firm.

Gust said his long association with Headlee, awell as the support of several local party leaders, led him to seek the U-M board seat nomination.

He also was persuaded to run after reviewing the economic situation of the university.

"I was reading in the U of M alumni

"I was reading in the U of M alumni publication that there is a drastic re-duction of federal and state funds.

We're going to have to go to the private sector to get more funds, and that going to be a challenge." Cust said.

"I'd like to try a different approach. There have always been foundations that have helped build libraries and buildings, but I'd like to go to them and show them the were-increasing need for student-aid money. Maybe CM or other companies could guarantee student loans under certain conditions," he added.

TEMPLIN, also a graduate of U-M, was unavailable for comment after the convention.
