There are three events in the com-petition — the hare and hound, the bean-bag drop and the convergent navigational task (CNT).

In the hare and hound, a lead hal-loon is launched 10 minutes before the pack, which then files off in pur-suit. The baloon that lands closest to the hare balloon is the wimer. The bean-bag drop is what it sounds like -a drop over a target with the closest drop the wimer. In the CNT, the baspital grounds are the target. It is up to the balloon-ists to figure wind conditions, then take their balloons five miles away from the target in whatever direction they choses. They launch them and they cnose.
