Exam prep courses to start at OU

Personalized instruction for individuals who plan to take the GMAT (Graduate Management Admissions Test) and SAT and ACT college admissions exams will be offered beginning Sept. 18 by the Oakland University Division of Continuing Education.
 The five-session GMAT will be conducted from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturdays, Sept. 18, 25 and Oct. 2, 9 and 16. GMAT is designed to provide insight into the types of questions that appear on the exam, which will include business judgment, data sufficiency, mathematical ability, English usage, reading comprehension, verbal ability, logical reasoning, and validity of conclusions. Deadline for the \$95 registration fee, which includes materials, is Wednesday, Sept. 15.
 The ACT (American College Test) workshop series preparing for the Oct. 30 exam is scheduled for Oct. 9, 16 and 23. Preparation for the SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) on Nov. 6 will be conducted in a series of sessions. Oct. 16, 23 and 30. Tuition, which includes materials, is \$65 per series.
 Registration deadline for the ACT workshop is Wednesday, Oct. 6, and for the SAT workshop is Wednesday, Oct. 13. Meeting times for all workshops is 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. for the first two meetings, and 9 a.m. to noon for the final meeting. Additional details may be obtained from the Continuing Education office, 377-3128, between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., weekdays.
 Workshops that prepare for taking the SAT and ACT exams will be conducted by qualified instructors and focus on the best approach to the tests for successful results. Instructors will analyze the mathematics section of the exams and carefully explain reading comprehension, sentence completion, analogies and analogy questions. Time will be spent on test-taking strategies and time-saving techniques.

Start to plan for winter energy savings

I hope to beat high fuel bills this winter by putting an energy conservation plan in effect now. Do you have any information on how to get started? I am particularly interested in solar energy and wood burning stoves. I hope it's not too early to get this information from you. I want to get started now before the snow flies.

It's never too early to start thinking about energy conservation. You don't tell me much about your home. Is it a house or an apartment? What type of heat do you have now? How much can you afford to spend? There are so many variables involved that answering you specifically in this column would be impossible.

I do have a few general suggestions that will help you and other readers considering energy conservation projects.

Give your local utility a call and request an energy audit. These audits cost only \$10 and will help you get a handle on where your problems actually are. At the same time, you can call or write to the Energy Extension Service Clearinghouse (EES). This is an information service which is available to all Michigan residents. A division of the Energy Administration of the Michigan Department of Commerce, the EES has a variety of energy information about conservation, renewable resources like solar and wind, new technologies and community and financial assistance.

The EES staff is available to help you with many kinds of energy questions. They have over 200 publications available just for the asking. Simply call the energy hotline any day between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at 1-800-292-4704.

Half-fare bus ID cards offered

For a limited time, senior citizens and handicapped people in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties can obtain a SEMTA half-fare photo identification card at no cost.

From Sept. 1 through Oct. 15, arrangements can be made for a SEMTA representative to visit a senior citizen meeting place and process the photo ID cards without cost, said general manager Gary Krause. Normally, a \$1 application fee is charged and the participant must supply a photo.

The ID passes enable senior citizens, aged 65 and older, and handicapped people to board any regularly scheduled SEMTA bus on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays and during weekday hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. at half fare.

To schedule a SEMTA representative for a visit, coordinators and others working with senior citizen groups and organizations should contact the SEMTA public affairs office at 258-8765. When calling, people should be able to supply information about how many photo ID cards will be needed and at least two preferred dates for the visit.

For people unable to visit a site where passes will be processed, applications may be filled out and mailed at no cost to SEMTA at the First National Building, 660 Woodward, Detroit 48228. Application forms are available by calling SEMTA at the same number. A one-inch square photo of the person applying must accompany the application.

To date, more than 6,000 seniors and handicapped citizens own and use the reduced fare passes in the tri-county area.

By making the processing of the cards convenient and at no charge, SEMTA continues its policy of putting its customers and their needs first.
