**TIP REPORTING** has replaced a 50-percent cutback in deductions for business meals on the big tax bill that recently passed the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives.

Birmingham restaurateur Harris Machus, treasurer of the National Restaurant Association, said the previously proposed business-meal cutback would "threaten the life of many restaurants and the jobs of those who work there."

He explained that tip reporting, beginning in 1983, will require restaurateurs to report to the federal government total gross sales, less carry-outs, and to report the total tip income reported by employees.

According to the new bill, 8 percent must be reported as tips by the tipped employees (such as waiters, waitresses and bartenders).

If less than 8 percent of the gross amount is reported by employees, the restaurant can get together with its service people to design a plan to equal this percentage.

If the restaurant and its employees can't come up with a program, the Secretary of the Treasury will prescribe how it is done.

"We don't think there's going to be a lot of problems, with us (the Machus restaurants), as far as under-reporting," Machus said.

How did the government happen to select 8 percent as the average for the reporting? "The IRS gets a pretty good handle on it when they audit charge tips," Machus said.

**BEN PEARLMAN**, who owns Bonjie's in Keego Harbor, said that eight weeks ago he converted the eatery into a fresh fish and seafood restaurant, with great success.

On the menu every night are 8-10 fresh fish entrees at moderate prices. "Our business has just flourished," Machus said.

The family restaurant is getting an older clientele, "people trying to keep their health up and who can afford fish dinners, which are more expensive than others," he said.

All ocean fish is flown in from Boston. A Boston scrod dinner is priced at \$5.95 and also includes a choice of boiled redskin potatoes or french fries, ratatouille or broccoli au gratin, tossed salad, bread and rolls. Wall paneling also are from Taiwan.

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
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
