# Study shows waste never discarded

The four barrels of chemical waste and 25 yards of earth dug up from a burial site on the Franklin Hills County Club are still on the club grounds awaiting disposal.

DNR Investigator Tom Laird said Friday, "I had been misinformed that they had been disposed of. But after I contacted the president of the country club, he told me they still had it."

The club had to wait for test results before having the materials removed, said Laird. A licensed disposal site before having materials until it knows what it's receiving, he added.
