Football fans attending Michigan Wolverines home games this season are being offered a special shuttle service to and from the games to help them avoid traffic congestion and parking problems.

The Ann Arbor Transit Authority, in conjunction with the Ann Arbor Conference and Visitors Bureau, will operate the shuttle service between Michigan Stadium and some 15 different boarding locations in the city.

Fans will be able to park their cars at any of several designated hotels, motels and restaurants, take an AATA bus to the stadium and then return to their parking locations after the game.

According to executive director Richard Simonetta, AATA will use 12 buses with two additional vehicles on stand-by to handle any excess demand.

One-way fare will be \$1.50. The shuttle service will begin at 11 a.m., two hours before kickoff time on home football Saturdays, and will operate out of five general areas.

The North shuttle service will leave from the Red Roof Inn on Plymouth Road at U.S. 23 and stop at the Marriott Inn, Arbor Lodge Motel and Lamp Post Motel before arriving at Crisler Arena next to Michigan Stadium.

Also arriving at Crisler Arena will be the East shuttle, which will leave from the Holiday Inn (East) at U.S. 23 and Washtenaw and stop at Howard Johnson's and the Stage Stop Motel.

A third shuttle to Crisler Arena will leave from the Sheraton Inn near Interstate I-94 and South State Road with stops at the nearby Wolverine Inn and Hilton Inn.

A West shuttle will originate at the Arbor Valley Inn on Jackson Road and pick up fans at the Holiday Inn (West Bank) and Weber's Inn.

A downtown shuttle will leave from the Campus Inn at Huron and State streets with stops at Ann Arbor Inn and Maude's Restaurant downtown. Both of these shuttles will deliver fans to Allmendinger Park at Potter and Edgewood avenues just west of the stadium.

After the games, fans will return to Allmendinger Park or Crisler Arena to board shuttle buses back to their original boarding points.

Special signs and bus markings will help fans identify the various shuttle vehicles and their destinations.

The shuttle service is planned for all U-M home games including: UCLA (Sept. 25); Indiana (Oct. 2); Michigan State (Oct. 9) and Purdue (Nov. 13).

BICYCLE RIDES

Rights are a must for this evening journey and locks are recommended for protection during the feeding stopover at Shield's Pizza. The ride returns to the Royal Oak Library, 11 Mile and Main street, by midnight.

The Wolverine Sports Club will conduct its 46th Century Ride on Sunday, Sept. 19.

The ride will leave promptly at 7

a.m. from 13 Mile Road and Woodward in Royal Oak and will follow Woodward north to Flint and then back again. An emergency and repair van will sweep the course.

Participants can choose to ride a Century (100 miles), a Metric Century (124 miles), or a Double Metric Century (248 miles), depending on their riding ability and endurance.

Ride leaders will be Wolverine Sports Club touring captains T.J. Hill, J.C. Smith and Charlie Dodd with assistance from Wolverine Sports Club president Al Parks and club coach Mike Walden.

Entry fee is \$3 and includes a patch. Persons must be 12 years or older to enter.
