Canadian architect speaks at LIT

Is a bulldozer the "symbol of North America"? Are its city streets "waste-lands of parked cars"? Canadian archi-tect Arthur Erickson, who appeared at Lawrence Institute of Technology on Sept. 16, seems to think so.

Erickson, the first speaker in LIT's Archilecture Series, has said that most city architecture reeks of indifference because "architects are so rarely aware of their own powers of commu-nication."

Exicksons' most internationally rec-Ericksons' most internationality rec-opinized work is Simon Fraser Universi-ty in his native Vancouver. Although he does much of his work in his bometown, including reconstructing the city's cen-ter, he is also well known in the other nerts of the world. His international projects have included structures in Tokyo, Montreal, Japan and Arabia. He

is also exploring the possibility of open-ing an office in Peking, employing na-tive people, ideas and technology.

Erickson, though not well known in the United States, has been described by Philip Johnson, former chairman of Yale University's Dept. of Architec-ture, as "by far the greatest architec-ture in Canada, and maybe the greatest on the continent."

A graduate of McGill University, Erickson was featured on the cover of Time Magazine as "Canada's master architect." His firm, Arbur Erickson Architects (AEA), has offices in Vancouver, Toronto, Los Angeles and abroad.



LL Frank Lauboff of the Farmington Police Well or the Comment says that after reviewing witnesses' reports, the driver of a marono Chevette, Narenda (Nick) Sheth, 37, of Farmington Hills was given a ticket for failing to yield to oncoming traffic while making a left turn onto Mayfield from westbound Grand River.

A 47th District Court official said if A 47th District Court official said if found guilty of a traffic infraction, Sheth would have to pay a fine of \$40 because the accident resulted in an in-jury.

The driver of the other car, Claudia Wiseman, 27, of South Lyon, wasn't ticketed.

. While Sheth was treated and re-leased the same day from cuts he suf-fered in the accident, his 2-year-old son, Samir, required four days of hospi-talization and facial surgery. Earlier reports from Botsford Hospital spokes-man Buss Tuttle stating that the boy was treated and released on the day of

the accident were incorrect.

A spokesman for the family said the child's surgery was successful and Samir is "feeling OK, but weak." His father is the former manager of the Burger King restaurant in Farmington, directly across from the accident site.

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
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
