

Farmington police head for settlement

Contract negotiations between the city of Farmington and its public safety officers and sergeants are three months past the deadline. But neither side seems too concerned about the slow progress of labor talks. "Talks are always past the deadline," said City Manager Robert Deady.

Most cities in the state plan their budget using a fiscal year that ends on June 30, the same day the contracts usually expire. This year three-year pacts with Farmington public safety officers and the command officers expired on June 30. The 16 public safety officers are represented by the Teamsters Union,

the five sergeants by an independent association. Negotiation on non-economic issues have already been discussed in about a half-dozen meetings between the public safety officers and their Teamsters bargaining agent, Bill Mondorai, and are nearly completed. The public safety officers are scheduled to meet again with

the city bargaining unit on Oct. 29. The long delay, said PSO chief union steward Charles Lee, is caused by scheduling conflicts which make that date the only one convenient for members of both sides.

COMMAND OFFICERS are regrouping after recently decertifying the Teamsters as their bargaining representative in bargaining and have yet to schedule a negotiation session with city officials. Deady said the sergeants tentatively have scheduled their first bargaining session for the second week of October.

The current contract pays public safety officers a starting salary of \$15,423 and top pay of \$23,300. Senior officers who run the shift in the absence of a sergeant currently are paid \$24,050.

Starting pay for command officers in the current, expired contract pays sergeants a minimum of \$24,460 and top salary of \$28,780. The most recent demand on the table from the public safety officers, according to union spokesman Lee, calls for a 5 1/2-percent wage increase. The initial offer from the union called for a 7-percent wage hike — roughly equivalent

to the yearly increase in the previous three-year pact. Lee said public safety officers hope to secure a two-year contract with the city in this round of bargaining which he predicts should continue for another four months before a vote on ratification is conducted.

HE CHARACTERIZED the tenor of

bargaining as fair and ruled out any possibility of a strike or work stoppage by officers. "It's not even in our thoughts," Lee said. Police dispatchers, who, like public safety officers are members of the Teamsters Union Law Enforcement Local 128, presently are working under a contract that expires next June.

Lost congressional bid Mansour resigns Mercy post

Sister Agnes Mary Mansour is resigning her post as president of Mercy College of Detroit, effective July 1, 1983. The announcement was made by Dr. Robert G. Wiencek, chairman of the Mercy College board of trustees, after Mansour submitted her resignation during a Sept. 25 board meeting. Her plans are undetermined, she said. Mansour attracted attention this summer when she became a candidate in the Democratic primary in the 17th

Congressional District. She finished fifth in the Aug. 10 race, receiving nearly 2,400 votes. The district includes Southfield, Livonia, Redford Township and northwest Detroit.

Her candidacy was opposed by some church leaders. The Catholic nun also drew criticism for her moderate stand on the abortion issue. She characterized herself as a candidate who would work for social reform, passage of the ERA, and tight money policies.

"This decision was not arrived at quickly or easily," she said of her resignation. "I do believe it is appropriate and wise for Mercy to move to new leadership. All things considered, it is an ideal time for such a transition."

According to college spokeswoman Sylvia O'Neill, Mercy is financially sound and recently completed long-range and institutional goals.

MANSOUR WAS named the fourth president of the college in April 1971. During the past 12 years, she has guided the college through a period of rapid expansion. During her administration, the college witnessed an increased enrollment, balanced college budgets, construction of additional college facilities and increases in the college's endowment funds. Degree offerings expanded from three to six, and areas of study from 28 to 55, O'Neill said.

Mansour piloted programs in health care education. Four years ago she initiated the Weekend College, which allows adults the chance to earn a college degree while holding a job. She holds a doctorate in biochemistry from Georgetown University and has worked as a consultant to the federal government, regional accrediting agencies and professional associations at various colleges and universities in this country.

She currently is vice-chairwoman of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities and has served as chairwoman of the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Michigan. She also is a member of the American Council of Education's State Planning Council for Women in Higher Education.

Mansour is a director of Michigan Bell and NBD Bancorp and serves on the advisory council for Metropolitan Affairs Corp. of Detroit and Southeast Michigan. She also serves on the executive boards of Mt. Carmel Mercy Hospital and Medical Center and the Sisters of Mercy Health Corp.

A search committee composed of college trustees, faculty members and administrators has been formed to find a new president for the college, O'Neill said.
