Dear Mrs. T.: Mrs. R.T. You are not alone. Many people are plagued by this annoying problem. Timitus, a ringing in the ears, can also be heard as a booming, rushing or surfing sound from somewhere in the head.

A practical way to get relief is to do as you are already doing— listing to the radio or the T.V. Other ways are to keep a humming electric clock or an electric fan nearby.

Dr. Jack Pullec, a Los Angeles neuroctologist has devised a sound enmitting test instrument known as a tinnitus analyzer. The instrument measures the frequency range and noise intensity of the ringing in the patient's cars. He then uses a small device the size of a hearing aid — "a masker" — and tunes it to give off sounds that seem to neutralize the tinnitus. The "masker" which is worn by the person just as a hearing aid is worn, has been sexcessfuly n 82 percent of the cases where it has been tested.
