MICHAEL F. CAVANAGH

Judge Michael F. Cavanagh, Democratic candidate for the Michigan Supreme Court, was born and raised in Detroit. He comes from a family of lifelong political activists and Democrats including his late older brother Jerome, who served as Mayor of the City of Detroit from 1961-1969.

Cavanagh was elected District Judge in 1972 and in 1974 he was elected to the Michigan Court of Appeals for a 10-year term. He was the youngest person ever elected to the Appeals Court and is currently serving his eighth year on the Court.

BLAIR MOODY, JR.

Justice Blair Moody, Jr., was elected to the Michigan Supreme Court in 1976, following ten years as a Wayne County Circuit Court Judge and 13 years as a trial attorney.

Moody received his B.A. and LL.B. degrees from the University of Michigan.

Exceptionally well qualified, Justice Blair Moody, Jr., is deserving of re-election to the Michigan Supreme Court on November 2.

RICHARD AUSTIN
Secretary of State

Secretary of State Richard Austin was first elected to that office in 1970 and was re-elected in 1974 and 1978.

Austin, a Certified Public Accountant, is a graduate of the Detroit Institute of Technology. He was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention of 1961-62; a member of the Apportionment Commission (1963-65); Wayne County Auditor, 1966-70; member and former Board Member of the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants; and a delegate to SEMOG.

As Secretary of State, Austin has increased voter registration in the State of Michigan through legislation that permits voter registration at the time of obtaining a driver's license. He has also made tremendous improvements in the system of obtaining drivers' licenses and license plates.

Austin's distinguished record has earned him the right to be re-elected.

FRANK KELLEY
Attorney General

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley has held office since 1961. A graduate of the University of Detroit Law School, Kelley practiced corporation law in Detroit before moving to Alpena where he practiced law and served as Alpena City Attorney. While in Alpena, Frank Kelley was active in many public and charitable groups in northern Michigan.

As Attorney General, Kelley has vigorously fought on the side of consumers, particularly in the area of utility rate increases and containment of health care costs. Kelley has never hesitated to take an activist role on the side of the people.

Kelley is a fair and reasonable man who is motivated by his concern for justice and for impartial enforcement of the laws of the State of Michigan. Based on his outstanding record, Frank J. Kelley should be re-elected as Attorney General of the State of Michigan on November 2.
