			SUPERINTENDENT'S STATEMENT		
			The increased revenue, as shown above, was generated in the main by the fact that the District took on the additional responsibility of managing the High School Completion Program in consortium with the Farmington and Novi Schools.		
			This increased revenue allowed the District to continue its educational programs without further cuts.		
			The money which was provided by the sale of Edgewood Elementary School in 1980 and placed in the District's Sile Fund, was used to replace and repair all of the school roofs in the District. It also was used to renovate other areas of the buildings. Prior to this it was impossible to keep the buildings in good repair because of lack of funds in the school operating budget.		
			As a result of a federal grant the District was able to accomplish a number of energy conservation projects which should help to reduce energy use in the future.		
			It was the goal of the Board of Education to operate on a balanced budget despite inflation and this was accomplished.		
			Certain trends continued unabated in the District:		
			1. Student enrollment continued to decline but at a slightly less rate than in past years.		
			2. The local tax payers continued to bear an ever increasing share of the general fund (operating) revenue, about 84%.		
			3. The cost of educating each student continues to increase at a pace equal to or greater than the inflation, 7.0%.		
			As Superintendent of Schools, I recommend that the District continue to closely monitor revenues and expenditures to assure that it operates with a balanced budget while continuing to provide an excellent education for the students it serves.		
			This may prove difficult in light of the fact that the State, which should support education, is having serious financial troubles. It may be necessary to reduce some programs in the future in order to keep the District financially solvent.
