reverence, purity and tranquility, in-terpret the spirit and frame of mind when encountering other people."

"Most educated young women of Japan study the ceremony in preparation for marriage as it teaches proper eti-quette, deportment and discipline," Bowman said.



The statewide testing program is co-sponsored by the American Diabetes Association, Michigan Affiliate and is open to persons 18 and older who have not previously been diagnosed as dia-betic.


Advanced first aid class given at reduced prices


An advanced first aid course will begin at 6:30 p.m., Dec. 3 in Livonia Red Cross, 29691 Six Mile.
