"They saked me to go and I went without question," Gannia said. "It was something I was brought up on — like my father and my grandfather. But it wasn't the way they said it was and it didn't hit me "lil then when I was over

didn't hit me 'til then when I was over there."
While he objects to depictions of the Victams veteran as a social misifi and a drug-crazed killer, Gannia said he carries some physical and emotional sears from the war experience.
"I was in counseling 20 months," Gannia said. "I went in paranold, skittish of everyone. I carried a gun. I didn't trust anyone or believe in them."
The Bamboo Rap, a counseling group formed at the Veteran's Adminstration's Outreach Clinic in Detroit helped him immensely, he said.

"THERE I COULD scream, yell, rant, rave, get it all out of my system," said Gannia. "Before that I hit rock bottom. I was out on the streets, sleeping in phone booths with nothing but what was on my back."

He said he sought help because he didn't want to "let down" the soldiers he ted in Vietnam who died in combat. He's active in pushing for increased benefits for Viet vets and greater re-

search into the effects of Agent Orange on soldiers and the Victnamese people who lived with the defoliant. George Salaty, of Centerline, is vice-president of the Detroit chapter of VIA. He works for Detroit Edision as a power plant operator and can't take time off from work to travel to Washington this week. But he says he'll visit he memorial on Nov. 20.

While reporters for newspapers and enleworks will attempt to describe the Victnam experience in reports about the memorial, Salaty said he has to see it and feel it himself.

"I don't want others to tell me what I should feel. Whatever I feel, I feel."


as soon they spent the money (for the memorial) on mental health or rehabilitation of veterans.
