Reading fine print brings costly win Because his home is on the border of Farmington and Farmington Hills and the neighbors across the street uso sep-tic tanks, Kolasa auspects other Farm-ington residents may have seplic lanks and a refund coming for every year they paid. Further, if these homeowners' prop-erty lines are farther than 100 feet from the existing sewer line, Kolasa said, they wort have to pay to connect to city sewers. feet or closer to the residents' property. The manhole city workers inspected is located approximately 55 feet from the cast edge of Kolasa's %-acre lot.
