feet or closer to the residents' property.  
The manhole city workers inspected is located approximately 55 feet from the east edge of Kolasa's 3/4-acre lot.

"I'M NOT going to fight this other ordinance," Kolasa said. "But I'll look at it carefully. If I have to hook up, I'll hook up."

Because his home is on the border of Farmington and Farmington Hills and the neighbors across the street use septic tanks, Kolasa suspects other Farmington residents may have septic tanks and a refund coming for every year they paid.

Further, if these homeowners' property lines are farther than 100 feet from the existing sewer line, Kolasa said, they won't have to pay to connect to city sewers.

Deadman doubts there are other Farmington residents using outlawed septic tanks.

However, he admitted city officials had no idea Kolasa's house wasn't connected until he brought the matter to the attention of city officials and Contact 10, a consumer service of The Detroit News.

"But if there's another one out there we'll look at it one case at a time," Deadman said in response to Kolasa's

charge that others might be paying for sewer treatment unnecessarily.

Florida has asked Kolasa if he's sorry he opened his mouth now that it looks like it'll cost him thousands of dollars in sewer hookup fees. Kolasa said he just wants what's right done.

As for city officials, if nothing else comes out of the issue, Deadman said at least he knows somebody reads the legal ads the city pays to run in the local newspaper.

lots of money they probably enticed citizens to participate. Here we were with a 80-20 percent arrangement. Well it's getting to be 50-50, with further cuts likely to come," he said.

"No one can challenge the fact these programs are worthwhile, but I wonder where their (senior citizens') families are. And it seems we could get the Goodfellow, scouting and other service groups involved," added Williams.

City Manager Lawrence Savage said many service groups are already involved.

Wolf called the service "one that has become essential. Only 23 percent (of those eligible) are using it and that's not enough. But it's essential to people who need and use it."

Burwell wondered whether the city verifies the income of seniors who use the program by examining tax returns. Soronen responded, "to cut their lawn?"

She added: "I would like to have opportunity to continue the programs this year. These people are now depending on us for winterizing their homes and shoveling snow with the winter season coming."

"I would move that we accept the recommendation and provide the money."

Wolf supported the motion and with Dolan requested a complete report on Chore and Outreach before the council again examines the funding problem.

The \$8,115 allocation will be divided into \$7,123 for Chore and \$987 for Outreach.

By the end of the current contract year, Outreach will have put in 800 hours serving 168 clients in the Farmington area, including 80 handicapped persons and 70 more whose incomes are at or below the poverty level.

Home Chore workers have invested 2,500 hours according to Gaynor.
