Speaking at an Israel Bond Tribute Dinner honoring Southfield residents Irving and Florence Hermelin, Ander-son said that while the Israelis didn't plan or want the massacre of civilians in Beirut, they are responsible because

THE ISRAELIS agroed not to go into Beirut, Anderson said. But the PLO, after agreeing to leave, instead hid out and staahed their weapons, he said.
