Here are some tips for cutting tax bills

HIS LAST column in our three-part series on year-end fi-incial planning, we'll discuss how you can cut your 1982 tax

■ bill.

• Accelerate your deductions. If you are itemizing your deductions, the old maxim — "accelerate deductions into this year and defer income into the next" — is especially true for 1982.

You should give special attention to medical and dental deductions. Starting in January, medical expenses wan't be deductible until they exceed 5 percent of your adjusted gross income, up from 3 percent.

Here are additional strategies. You may send now your state income tax on property taxes for the fourth quarter of 1982, which are not due until January. You should consider making charitable contributions now. Remember that deductible expenses charged on a credit card can be written off in 1982 even if the bills are not paid

this year.

• Open an IRA or a Keogh. This year for the first time every• Open an IRA or a Keogh. This year for the first time everyweight income earned from a job can open a tax-saving IRA. You
have until the date you file your 1982 tax return to establish on IRA.
Any contributions you make between Jan. 1 and the time you file
can be deducted from your 1982 income.
Self-employed people who haven't established a Keogh plan need
to act last. Keogh contributions will not be deductible for 1982 unless the account is set up by the end of this year, although—as with
IRA — you have until you file your return to make 1982 contributions.

This year you can put 15 percent of your income into a Keogh, up to a maximum of \$15,000.

• Review your investments. You should think twice before solling a security that has dropped in price just to get a tax loss this year. If the markets continue rising in 1983, stock and bond holders who hang on will have a twofold reason to rejoice, since their capital gains most likely will be taxed at a lower rate.

• Do some estate planning, Before the year is over, you may want to change the beneficiary named in your company pension, IRA or annuity — unless the beneficiary is your spouse. The new tax law soys that in 1983 no more than \$100,000 in benefits from those plans can be excluded from estate tax after you die, if your entire estate is work more than \$275,000.
