Blackmer, a senior, closed out his prep career in intrilling fashion by kicking a 24-yard field in the second over-time to litt the Hawks past rugged Dearborn Fordson, 17-14, in the state Class A title fast field goal int' really a Testure field goal; said the 5-foot-10, 180-yand Blackmer, who tied the state record when he kicked a 55-yarder in 1981 and made good on a couple of 47-yarders this season, at a post-game press conference.

Now Harrison, the owner of 23-straight football victories, has a Class A title to go with the Class B crown it won in 1981.

Caach John Herrington, who's guided the Hawks to 12-straight wins this season, added, 'I knew he'd make it. I never had a doubt.'

Blackmer, who's leaning toward the University of Michigan, is a real triple threat, running from the fullback position on offense and playing a rugged linebacker on defense.

Sophomore sensation John Miller, Harrison's other offensive weapon, played yet another outstanding game at tailback.

Despite suffering a "slight" aboutler separation in practice last week, the 6-2, 130-pound Miller gained 70 yards on 10 carriers, proved himself an danger ous pass receiver and secored both Hills touchdowns on short runs.


