Mercy, trailing perennial-champion Flint Northern by 19 polits at the three-quarter mark, staged a furious fourth-quarter comeback to upset the favored Flint five, 61-58, before more than 2,100 fans.

With the victory, coach Larry Baker's Mercy club closed out an excellent 24-1 season. Northern, which was shooting for a fifth-straight Class A champlonship, went out at 25-3.
Baker, who's guided Mercy to stardom in his eight years on the beach, had trouble steering his two stars—junior Sarah Basford and sophomore Amy DeMattla—off the Calihan court in the pandemonium which followed the final buzzer.

The 5-foot-9 Basford kept it from

being a total blowout with her accurate outside shooting early on, and the 5-11 DeMattia provided the inside scoring punch that brought the Marlins back. After the game, nether could move five feet without being descended upon and hugged by Joyou fans.

The Waterford public schools had no swimming pools (and thus no swim teams) in the late 1969s—and they still don't. And the private swimming colusts, so popular in some parts of Oakland County, just weren't part of the Waterford scene back then. But Baer didn't let the lack of a competitive swimming background (she was a member of Mitchigan State University's synchronized swim team for two years) keep her from building a winner in her third season at Adams.

Her Highlanders were the surprise of the recent Class A state champlonship meet at MSU's McCaffree Pool with a fourth-place finish and 78 points. Adams completed its best season ever with an 11-3 overall record and a third-place finish behind libringham Groves and Bloomfield Hills Lahser in the swimming strong Metro Suburban Activities Association.

For her accomplishments, Baer has been named Coach of the Year on the Observer & Eccentric's all-area girls' swimming team, which was picked recently by a panel of area coaches.
