# It's bombs away on HHS

Olivia Newton-John will have a lot of fans in Plymouth and Canton by the time this basketball season is over. No doubt the Australian starlet's hit song, "Let's get physical," will be at the top of the community's charts, if the Rocks' first game is any indication — a 65-41 romp over a smaller, over-

powered Farmington Harrison squad Friday at Harrison.

Salem led by six after one quarter (19-13) and a 10-0 surge in the first six minutes of the second period secured the Rocks' victory. Any chance the Hawks had to get back into the contest started and ended at the free throw line, where they managed to convert just seven of 20 attempts, missing the

front end nine times in one-and-one situations.

"WE DIDN'T back down or anything," said Harrison coach Mike Teachman. "But it got to be a meat grinder out there. They beat on us so much we couldn't shoot free throws."

Harrison closed to within 13 in the third quarter but Salem ended the period with an 11-4 streak, with Rick Berberet banking in six, to keep the Rocks in control.

Dave Houle topped Salem with 17 points. Berberet added 10 and John Cohen connected for eight. Jones' 12 markers led Harrison, now 0-2 in the season, with Dave Younger and Gordie Dawson next with six apiece.

## Falcons swim past Southfield

Alice Campbell won two individual events and swam a leg on a first-place relay Thursday to lead Farmington's swimming squad past Southfield, 72-56.

Campbell established a Farmington pool record of 55.2 in the 100-yard butterfly and also won the 200-yard individual medley in 2:06.3. Farmington's freestyle relay (Campbell, Chris Edwards, Randy Gallinger and Fred Courville) posted a winning time of 3:33.5.

Edwards won the 50 free (23.3), Gallinger finished first in the 200 free (1:55.8) and Jay Weaver won 100 backstroke (1:03.2) and combined with Eric Davis, Mike Wolford and Steve Galat to win the medley relay in 1:52.2.

Southfield's Landgraf won the 100 breaststroke (1:09.9), and teammate Jewett won the diving competition (209.80 points).

Southfield, now 1-1, has a meet at Farmington Harrison on Tuesday. Farmington, 1-0 this season, swims next on Thursday at Wayne Memorial.

Scott Slinson was a double winner for North Farmington, with wins in the 200 (2:00.9) and 500 (8:27.4) freestyle.

Kevin Golin recorded the Raiders' other first with a 54.03 in the 100 butterfly.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the cost of the Cadell Drain, to serve areas in the City of Novi, the City of Farmington Hills and the City of Farmington, has been tentatively apportioned as follows, to wit:  
Public Corporation  
City of Farmington Hills 60.50%  
City of Farmington 11.90%  
City of Novi 3.80%  
County of Oakland, on account of drainage of county highways 5.60%  
State of Michigan, on account of drainage of state highways 18.20%  
100.00%  
Tentative Percentage of Cost  
NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that the Drainage Board for the Cadell Drain, will meet at 1:30 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on Wednesday, the 28th day of January, 1983, in the office of the Oakland County Drain Commissioner, Public Works Building, 1 Public Works Drive, Pontiac, Michigan, for the purpose of hearing any objections to the said apportionments.  
NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that the plans, specifications and estimates of cost of said Cadell Drain and also, a description of the area to be served thereby are on file in the office of the Oakland County Drain Commissioner, Public Works Building, 1 Public Works Drive, Pontiac, Michigan. The said estimated cost is \$5,500,000, but the apportionment percentages as finally established by the Drainage Board shall apply to the actual cost of said drain when finally completed.  
NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that at said hearing any public corporation to be assessed, or any taxpayer thereof, will be entitled to be heard.  
NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that after consideration of all objections to the apportionments the Drainage Board shall determine whether the apportionments fairly reflect the benefits to accrue to each public corporation and the extent to which each public corporation contributes to the conditions which make the drainage necessary. If the Drainage Board determines that the apportionments are equitable it will enter a Final Order of Apportionment confirming the apportionments. Section 483 of Act No. 40, Public Acts of Michigan, 1956, as amended, provides that the Final Order of Apportionment shall not be subject to attack in any court, except by proceeding in certiorari brought within 30 days after the order is filed in the office of the Oakland County Drain Commissioner, the Chairman of the Drainage Board for the Cadell Drain, and that if no such proceedings shall be brought within said 30 day period the legality of the assessments for the drain shall not thereafter be questioned in any suit at law or in equity, either on jurisdictional or non-jurisdictional grounds.  
NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that if the Drainage Board enters the Final Order of Apportionment a special assessment roll assessing the estimated cost of the drain against the public corporations in accordance with the confirmed apportionments will be prepared and presented to the Drainage Board for approval. The Drainage Board then intends to issue bonds of the Cadell Drainage District in anticipation of the collection of installments of said assessments and the interest thereon. Each public corporation assessed is obligated to levy sufficient taxes to pay the assessment installments and interest as the same become due unless there has been set aside moneys sufficient therefor.
