GAS TAX - By a vote of 236 for and 169 against, the House adopted an amendment that raises the federal gasoline tax 5 cents a gallon. The purpose is to finance 45.5 billion a year worth of projects upgrading mass transit, U.S. highways and bridges.

The bill provides funding for conventional and nuclear weapons systems, military salaries and pensions, and scores of other Pentagon outlays. It represents an increase of 6 percent ever 1982 military appropriations, after adjustment for inflation.

SENATE

WIDER TRUCKS - The Senate rejected, 31 for and 62 against, an amendment to retain the 98-inch maximum width for trucks plying interstate highways.

The vote left intact language in the fiscal 1983 U.S. Transportation Department appropriations bill to allow 102-inch truck widths. Coincidentally, the issue arose at the same time Congress is moving to allow larger trucks as part of the new nickel a gallon gasoline tax.

The bill (HR 7019) was passed and sent to conference with the House. Sen. Thomas Engleton, D-Mo., sponsor of the amendment, sald: "Let those monitors roll down the highways to-morters roll down the highways to-morrow. Let them chew them up and do not ask them for a penny. What made America great? Big, bigger, and biggest trucks? Poppycock."

## Religion courses double at MSU

Michigan State University's undergraduates are enrolling in religion courses in far greater numbers than hast year, reports Robert T. Anderson, chairman of MSU's Department of Religious Studies.

"The stigma of taking religion courses is also casing," he said, "Students are realizing that we're an eademic department, not a seminary. Only about 30 percent of our graduates actually go lato a religious profession."

He says enrollment in winter term classes is projected to be \$49 students, almost double the winter 1982 enrollment of 288 students.

Anderson notes that students can now use religion courses to satisfy general education requirements needed by all MSU students for graduation, which partially explains the enrollment increase.

HE ESTIMATES that about two-thirds of the department's grauntes go on to graduate school. Others find jobs in fields ranging from social work to business.



The field of religious studies was quite successful in attracting students at state universities until the 1970s, Anderson said, when the emphasis in education began to shift to training for a profession.

In the past couple of years, this trend seems to be turning around. The interest is there, and students are beginning to get the message that a liber-

al arts education can be useful for more than teaching," he said.


