Lathrup shot a sizzling 50 percent from the field in beating a weak War-ren Cousino team, 56-46, in the tourney semifinal Wednesday.

Shafer, a 6-4 senior torward, led Lathrup with 14 points and sealor guard Ron Smith had 12. Baxter con-tributed 10 points and Riley had eight to go with his 11 rebounds.

"At times we looked very good," Kourtakis said. "At times we did some very good things."

Lathrup returns to action temorrow night at home against non-league Bloomfield Hills Andover. The Charg-ers' Metro Suburban Activities Associa-tion season resumes Friday night at Birmingham Groves.

Southfield's 'Popcorn' impresses MSU coach

There were the skeptles who thought. Ralph Walker had a great high school career but wouldn't make it in major college basketball.

And then there were the believers like Miehigan State's Jud Heatheote, who signed the Southfield High standard to a letter-of-intent last spring to play as a Spartan.
