County Receives Freedom Shrine

PONTIAC
The Freedom Shrine, an exhibit of historical documents, has been donated to Oakland County by the Pontiac Exchange Club for permanent display in the south entrance of the court house.

The shrine is a collection of 28 reproductions of American historical documents spanning the 325 years from the Mayflower Compact to World War II instrument of Surrender in the Pacific.

The shrine will be formally dedicated April 14 at 1 p.m. in the county's Board of Commissioners auditorium.

Circuit Judge William J. Beer will deliver the dedicatory address and accepting will be Robert Patales, chairman of the Board of Commissioners.

William E. Satterfield, Pontiac Exchange Club president, says: "The Freedom Shrine is the Exchange Clubs' positive rebuttal to all ideologies which would pervert or destroy our American way of life."
