Overtime pays for Falcon '5'

Farmington High had to go into overtime Friday to notch its second win of the season as the Falcons edged Livonia Bentley, 57-52, in Western Lakes Activities Association play.

The Falcons outscored the Bulldogs, 7-3, in overtime as all seven points came from the free-throw line. Matt Kany, who led Farmington with 15 points, hit four of four free throws in the overtime. Chris Keller was 2-for-2, while Tim Carruthers had one.

Carruthers had 12 points in the game, while Dan Zang and Dan Singer each netted 10. Tim Thorderson had 18 for Bentley.

"When you're struggling like we are, it's a very good win," Farmington coach Rich Roy said. "We had a nine-point lead, but Bentley made a great comeback. They came back real strong."

Bentley outscored Farmington, 16-12, in the fourth quarter to necessitate the overtime period.

Overall, Farmington hit 21 of 29 free throws for 72 percent.

Tuesday, the Falcons are at North Farmington.

NORTH FARMINGTON found out a home court isn't always an advantage as the Raiders lost to Garden City, 70-59, in a game where the visitors went to the free-throw line more times than the hosts.

The Raiders hit five of eight free throws while Garden City went to the line a whopping 38 times and made 30 for 79 percent.

Scott McCloskey, who hits 12 of 15 free-throw attempts, had 32 points for Garden City to lead all scorers.

Will Reineke had 21 points to lead North. Ray Boyle scored 13 points, and Mike Black had 12 points, 10 rebounds and 11 assists.

North Farmington led after three quarters, 41-40, but a 30-18 scoring advantage for Garden City in the final quarter quickly turned it around.

North fell to 1-4 in the Northwest Suburban League, and 4-6 overall.

The Raiders are home to Farmington Tuesday.

FARMINGTON HARRISON was outscored, 15-7, in the final quarter Friday night as Northville posted a 50-44 Western Lakes Activities Association victory.

Wes Jones had 12 points for the Hawks, and Don Lacey added 10. Steve Schrader scored 14 for the winners.

"It was a classic case of five-on-seven," Harrison coach Mike Teachman said afterward. "We were 3 of 12 from the floor in the fourth quarter, and all our shots were in the lane, yet no fouls were called. They (Northville) didn't catch up to us, the whistles caught up to us."

Harrison which trailed at the half, 26-23, led going into the fourth quarter, 37-33.

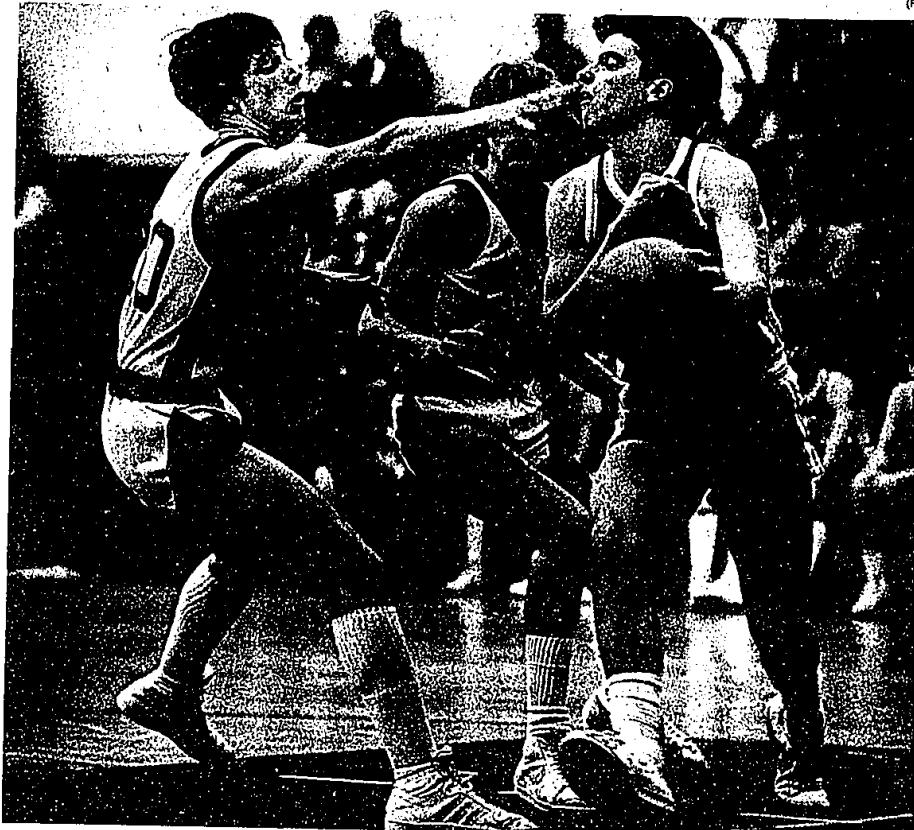
The Hawks went to the line 16 times and hit 12 free throws, while Northville hit 16 of 25.

Senior Jo Smith and sophomore Katie MacIntosh paced Farmington's 108.6-106 gymnastics victory over Grosse Pointe North Thursday.

Smith finished first on the uneven parallel bars with a score of 8.3 and also had a second place in vaulting (7.1) and thirds on balance beam (6.8) and in floor exercise (8.2). MacIntosh won the beam (7.7), took seconds on the bars (7.25) and in floor (8.3), and earned a third in vaulting (7.65).

Grosse Pointe's Karen McCarthy won vaulting (8.4) and floor exercise (8.5) and placed third on bars (7.2). Farmington, now 3-2 under coach Maria Scharrenberg, hosts Troy at 7 p.m. on Monday.

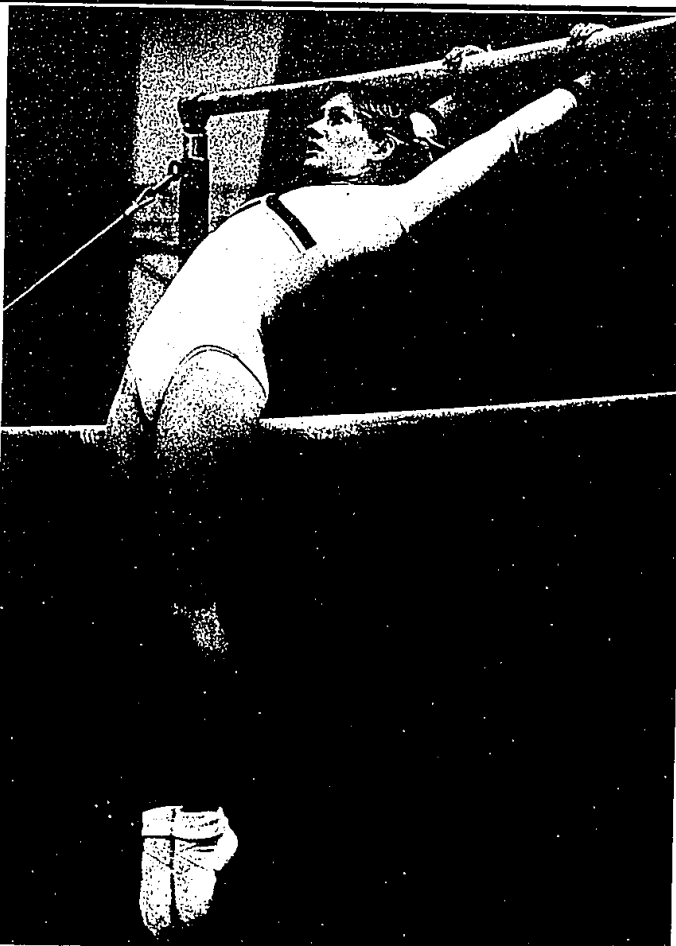
NORTH FARMINGTON raised its gymnastics record to 5-0-1 Thursday with a 123.6-105.9 win over Westland John Glenn.

North's 400-yard freestyle relay (Craig Burland, Bob Salisbury, Mike Busati, Scott Stinson) finished first with a time of 3:38.6. North's other two firsts: Steve Manderfield (1:06.9 in the 100 breaststroke) and Brian Goinis (53.6, 100 butterfly).

Edsel Ford's Deeter won the 200 freestyle (1:34.4) and the 500 freestyle

(5:12.7).

North is home to Livonia Franklin on Thursday. The Northwest Suburban League game begins at 7 p.m.

ALEC CAMPBELL and Chris Edwards winning two individual events each couldn't save Farmington High from a suffering 65-60 swimming loss to Plymouth Salem Thursday. The result left Salem at 4-1 and Farmington at 3-3.

Campbell finished first in the 200-yard individual medley (2:04.8) and the

100 butterfly (54.7), and Edwards took the 50 freestyle (23.1) and the 100 freestyle (50.3).

Randy Gallinger of Farmington won the 500 freestyle with a time of 5:09.4, and teammate Eric Davis won the 100 breaststroke (1:08.7).

Some Salem firsts: Todd Riedel (2:04.25 points in diving), Eric Kleinsmith (1:52.7, 200 freestyle) and Tim Harwood (1:00.3, 100 backstroke).
