lawyer and served as Ritchard

CONSERVATIVES have been lining up behind Abraham in recent weeks. Robert J. Huber, who ran second in the 1982 U.S. Senate primary, last week revealed Spencer is the No. 2 choice of precinct delegates who answered a poll made by his organization, Michigan Cilizens Supporting the Presidency.

Of 331 persons who answered the survey, there were 264 points for former state Sen. Jack Weiborn, 252 for Abraham, 168 for Headdee, 157 for-Huber and 93 for Oakland Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson. Since neither Weiborn, Headlee, Huber nor Patterson is a candidate for the chairmanhip, that leaves Abraham as the conservatives' top choice.

Asked why he believes Abraham is more qualified than the other two candidates, Murphy said, "We need a change from the organization we've had.

"Ranny Riccker is a great lady and a great Republican. But she doesn't represent a change.
"Dick Chrysler would be a change."

He's a high-caliber Republican who would be very competent to do the job if elected.

"BUT I support Spence because the party leadership backs him." Riceker, of Midland, has been Michi-gan's GOP national committeewoman since 1988, and Chrysler is a Brighton bullessense.

Murphy said be's confident that 'more than a majorly' of Oakland's 250 GOP delegates will support Abraham. It will take 333 of the party's 1,855 delegates to pick a replacement for retiring Charman Mel Larsen of Walled Lac aurman Mel Larsen of Walled Lac aurman Mel Larsen of Larsen of the Murphy's support is significant because he generally backs the moderate mainstream of the Michigan GOP.

MURPHY'S ENDORSEMENT is montairs Enforcement is fobviously significant because he's the Republican official representing the largest number of constituents in Mich-igan, Abraham noted. Abraham cited his experience in "all mechanics of campaigning — fund raising, polling, research, precinct or-sanization.

"In almost every part of the party, there's strong sentiment that we need that kind of technical, nuts-and-bolts, grass-roots rebuilding."

If elected, Abraham intends "to bring people in the party together to build and grow and be competitive in 1984.

"We must expand our base of donors from 20,000 and go into communities that haven't been tapped yet rather than seeking bigger and bigger dona-tions from a small pool."

JERRY ROSEN, chairman of the 17th Congressional District GOP organization and its 1982 candidate, added he supports Abraham not only because he's technically qualified, but also because he has good ideas for broadening the party's hase.

"He has good ideas for reaching out to new constituents — women, minorities, blue collar workers."

Louis E. Lataif, Ford Division general manager, told the Grand Rapids Economic Citob be is optimistic about the outlook for the auto industry and the nation's economy in general. "I foresee a real improvement in automotive sales, and 1983 should be the start of the long-term recovery of the industry," he said.

"There's a lot of buying power because auto in-stallment debt is the lowest in modern history. There is the financial capacity to buy automobiles in greater numbers; but until recently, consumer confidence has been lacking.
