"That partisan argument comes up every year when appointments are made." Murphy said. "I can sit and laugh because if Republicans were in the minority, they'd be making the same arguments the Democrats are making now."

"A LOT OP us were resentful that these things were arrived at without full participation," said Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Southfield, who hopes the Quadrant process is dead. Sen. John Engler, R-Mt. Pleasant, who replaced VanderLann as minority leader, also dislikes the Quadrant, even though he now would be a member. "It circumvented the legislative committee process," said Engler, serving his second term in the Senate after four terms in the House.
