

Symposium on Rivera murals set for March 5

Detroit Institute of Arts will celebrate the 50th anniversary of its Diego Rivera murals with a symposium Saturday, March 5.

The murals, completed in 1933 by the Mexican artist and titled, "Detroit Industry," are recognized as the finest of Rivera's work in North America. They are one of the few major modern works of art centered on technology.

Leading scholars will participate in the symposium to re-evaluate the aesthetic, historic and philosophic importance of the murals after 50 years.

Speakers include: Alicia Azuela, Institute of Aesthetic Research, University of Mexico; Hayden Herrera, New York art critic and Frida Kahlo scholar; Dorothy McMeekin, professor, department of natural science, Michigan State University; Laurence Huriburt, Mexican muralist scholar; Francis V. O'Connor, American art scholar and author of the book, "Art for Millions"; Linda Downs, curator of education, Detroit Institute of Arts; and Ellen Sharp, curator of graphic arts, Detroit Institute of Arts.

McMeekin will discuss the contemporary scientific theories illustrated in Rivera's work. Azuela will explore Rivera's radical change in ideology between his Mexican murals and "Detroit Industry."

Herrera will discuss the interest in Mexican folk art and Pre-Columbian art shared by Rivera and his artist-wife, Frida Kahlo and O'Connor will describe Rivera's influence on American artists of the 1930s.

Huriburt will contrast Rivera's Detroit with his New York work and Downs and Sharp will re-evaluate the aesthetic importance of the murals.

Registration for the symposium is open to the public. It will be from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Detroit Institute of Arts lecture hall.

Fee is \$20, \$15 to Founders Society members and students with I.D. Limited lunch reservations, \$7, are available. To register, call 839-8004. Sponsored by the Founders Society.

The 27 panels cover 2,274 feet of wall space and depict aspects of automobile manufacturing as well as the pharmaceutical and chemical industries in Detroit.

The work was painted in true fresco technique, directly on wet plaster wall in the area beyond the main entrance which is known as Rivera Court.
