Rivera's radical change in ideology be-tween his Mexican murals and "Detroit Industry."

Herrera will discuss the interest in Mexican folk art and Pre-Columbian art shared by Rivera and his artist-wile, Frida Kahlo and O'Connor will describe Rivera's influence on American artists of the 1930s.

Hurlburt will contrast Rivera's De-troit with his New York work and Downs and Sharp will reevalunte the aesthetic importance of the murals.
