'Unit trust' bonds offer investors floating rates

NE WAY TO REDUCE risks of investing in municipal bond is to buy unit trusts. These trusts, periodically offered by a grup of large brokers, are packages of municipals. They canbe long-or intermediate-term.

A relatively new type consists of "floating rate" industrial-rowcue municipals. One such trust offerd by four of the largest brokerage flus yielded approximately 85 percent of the prime rate.

Since the interest rate floats up and down with the general intest level, the principal will show little change.

IN THIS UNIT TRUST are 15 bonds with maturities ranging fromto to 12 years. Each is backed by a bank letter of credit, and the interesof each is determined by that bank's primer rate. One unit costs \$1,000 with a three-quarter percent commission. Genrally, there is a floor of 7 percent and a ceiling of 25 percent on to interest. One possible problem with floating-rate units is that everif interest rates fail, holdings will show no capital gain.

MUNICIPAL BOND mutual funds offer diversity. Some funds sixk with abort maturities, say five or 10 years. The closer to maturity, to less a bond's price will fall if interest rates rise.

There are many municipal bond mutual funds on the market, eah specializing in different areas and different maturities.
