He will devote a part of his lecture to discussing and playing songs of the Great Lakes' sallors.

"Traditional songs have themes that don't come up in popular songs which usually deal with teen age love. Traditional music is much broader than that," Winans sald. "There are true loves songs, such as about courtable. There are true loves songs, but there are even more unfaithful or unsuccessful love's songs. Love is often tied with death, it is seen as something scrious

that sometimes leads to death."

THE COMING OF rate people to lind entertainment without providing their own. Winans said that though folk music is still being created, the bulk of it is from the 19th century.

But, he said, there is a renewed interest in the music and in traditional square and contra dancing. He said many young musiclans have begun to revive the old songs and are keeping the tradition alive.
