## Troy, Lathrup win league gym crowns

Following the adage that the rich get richer, Troy High's gymnasts rolled up 151.3 points Saturday to win their fifth straight Southeastern Michigan Association league meet.

The Colts, league champs since they entered the SMA, have conquered another goal in a succession of objectives they hope will lead to the ultimate — the Class A state championship.

Troy, which finished the dual-meet season with a 12-0-1 record, won the competitive Dearborn High Invitational in January.

In the league meet, the Colts were followed by Royal Oak Kimball (126.85), Birmingham Seaholm (126.15), Bloomfield Hills Andover (117.7), Berkeley (105.5) and Ferris (100.1).

Kimball's Sharon McNie was the all-around champion with a score of 35.9. Andover's Amy Nadler was second (34.25), followed by Suzanne Enciso of Troy (34.1), Jenny Matz of Seaholm (33.85), Kathy Michaels of Troy (33.8) and Katie Dahn of Seaholm (33.55).

McNIE WAS first on the balance beam (8.9) and the uneven parallel bars (8.85). Enciso won the vaulting competition (9.45) and Michaels had the top score in floor exercise (9.3).

Enciso was fifth on the beam (7.85) and second on the floor (9.05), while Michaels also was second in vaulting (9.4) and fifth on the bars (7.85). Teammate Michele Sirna was fourth on the beam (8.0) and sixth off the vault (8.4).

Nadler posted a fifth on the vault (8.5), a fourth on the bars (8.2), a second on the beam (8.6) and tied for fourth with Matz on the floor (8.95).

Matz was third on the bars (8.5), fourth on the vault (8.65) and fifth on the beam (8.5).

Dahn was second on the bars (8.5), third on the beam (8.3) and sixth on the
